Dear Leader Schumer, Leader McConnell, Chair Murray, and Vice Chair Collins:

As representatives of disaster-impacted states, we write to request that adequate funding for recovery be included in any short-term continuing resolution that Congress acts on by the end of September.

While it is still not finished—and hurricane season is far from over—this year has been tragic for our states. Major disasters have been declared in 30 states and territories this year and many more have been declared in recent years. In Mississippi, tornadoes tragically killed more than 20 people. In California, months of extreme rain led to more than 20 fatalities and billions of dollars in damage. Floods and severe storms also swept through Alaska, Vermont, New York, Colorado, Massachusetts, Connecticut, and New Hampshire, leaving behind some of the worst damage Vermont has seen in memory. Snow storms devastated North and South Dakota, with spring flooding inundating communities and decimating the agricultural sector. Typhoon Mawar—the first Pacific typhoon of the season and the strongest tropical cyclone of the year thus far—impacted Guam and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands. Hurricane Idalia caused significant damage to farms, small businesses, and homes in Florida, Georgia, and South Carolina. And finally, fires on Maui in Hawaii killed an estimated 97 people and largely destroyed the historic town of Lahaina, leaving thousands displaced and faced with rebuilding in one of the most expensive communities in the country.

The list of tragic incidents in no way capture the depth of loss that they have caused our constituents. Nevertheless, first responders have run toward danger to save lives, local organizations have provided billions of dollars in assistance, and neighbors have stepped up to help one another. Our communities have done all they can under difficult circumstances and now the federal government must provide additional support.

Our governors have requested and received major disaster declarations, this year or previously, and federal relief is well underway, coordinated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) under the Stafford Act. We are grateful for the federal aid received thus far, but in order to continue federally-supported recovery operations, Congress must act to provide supplemental funding to a number of key departments and agencies to activate or continue recovery programs for our communities. These departments and agencies include, but are not limited to, FEMA, the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Small Business Administration, the Department of Transportation, the Economic Development Administration, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Treasury, the Department of Education, the Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of Energy, and the Environmental Protection Agency.

Thank you for working with us to provide critical relief to our states.
